CONSIDERATION OF OUR CHRISTIAN COMMITMENT: ORDINARY TIME RESPONSE

The Gospel today calls us to be faithful to all that has been shared and entrusted to us, to give as we have received. In the midst of all that has happened these past weeks, I know we have all witnessed so many people sharing with one another, and not necessarily from their abundance, but from their need. Many people will remember this flooding in different ways and with various regrets, but it is my hope that all of us will also recall memories of loving people sharing what had been entrusted to them.

We near the beginning of our Parish School of Religion (PSR) this week, and I know parents and youth have all been notified of the changes that will take place in our program this year. While notifying people of changes is one important thing, explaining some of the rationale that went into the changes is something else. I know Gwen Richard, Barbara Normand, Kevin Acord and our PSR office staff worked, prayed and discussed for many hours about what might work best for our youth this year, and I would like to explain some of the rationale behind the decisions. One of the underlying reasons for the changes is that many of our students may be getting out of regular school at 6:30 p.m. and would not be ready to return half an hour later for PSR. So our PSR team came up with the following decisions:

Our Elementary (1st-5th grades) PSR will remain about the same because the Livingston Public School System didn't extend the day for elementary students. They will meet on Monday at 4:30 and 6:30 and Wednesday at 4:30 and 6:30. Classes will begin for them on Monday, October 10th.

Our Middle School and High School PSR (6th-10th) grades will meet once a month for 90 minutes. These meetings will include prayer, a presentation, small group discussions and a reflection on the Gospel of the day. At the end of the session, two lessons will be sent home with the students to be completed at home, and they will form the basis of the prayer, presentation, group discussions and activities for the following class. These classes will meet once a month on Sunday, 6th grade from 12:30 till 2:00, and 7th and 8th grades from 2:30 till 4:00; on alternate Sundays, the 9th grade will meet once a month from 12:30 till 2:00, and the 10th grade from 2:30 till 4:00.

Our 11th grade Confirmation Class will have three classes – one on a Sunday from 12:30 till 3:00 p.m., one on a Saturday from 11:00 till 1:30, and one on Tuesday evening (it is Thanksgiving week and school will be out) from 6:00 till 8:00. On the Sunday and Tuesday classes a light meal

will be served, giving candidates the opportunity to come to the 11:00 or 6:00 Eucharist, meet after for a brief meal and fellowship, and then have class. We will still have the 12:00 Eucharist January 8th at the Cathedral and the Afternoon of Prayer to follow. Gwen Richard, Kevin Acord and our teachers will work together to make these classes both educational and fun. It will give some of our youth who come to class regularly the opportunity to meet Kevin and his workers and come to know a bit more about Immaculate Conception Student Ministry. **When all is said and done, I think a lot of prayerful reflection has gone into the decisions which we hope will make this PSR year a good and graced time for all. Please keep our youth, their parents and teachers in your prayers.**

I would like to share some dates, and names with you that explain where I was last week. In 1226, St. Francis of Assisi, my patron saint, was called to his reward. About twenty years later, some Franciscans showed up in Ennis, Co. Clare, Ireland. My ancestor, Donagh O'Brien, King of Thomond, took a liking to them and built a small Friary for them near his castle before he died in 1246, twenty years after St. Francis. By 1286, sixty years after St. Francis's death, the Friary had grown and Donagh's great-grandson, Turlogh O'Brien, another ancestor, who died in 1306, had

built a large stone Friary. In time Turlogh and his wife were both buried in the Friary church. At the time of the Reformation, Henry VIII closed the abbey and it went into ruin. In the last century the friars were allowed back and now have a new Friary near the old ruined one which is now a national monument in Ireland. About a year ago, I had set Fall vacation days, and made arrangements to be in Ennis with the friars for retreat days. They were really good days, and

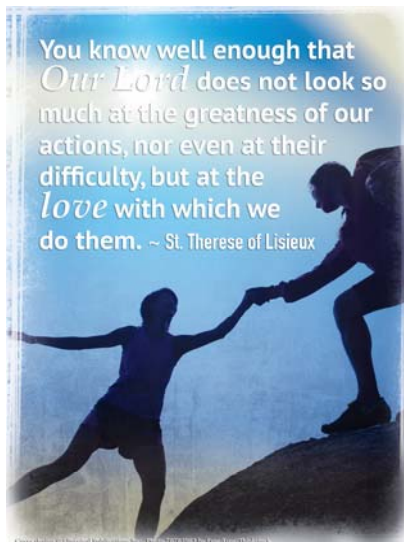
Worldwide Marriage Encounter

Anybody feeling a little Stressed?

I think it is safe to say that we have all had better summers. I also think it is safe to say that stress is something we have all had increase in our lives. Stress can cause unhealthy physical symptoms if it goes on for too long, such as in response to life's daily challenges and changes. When stress occurs, your body gets ready to jump out of the way, but you're sitting still. With stress, your body is working overtime, with no place to put all the extra energy. This can make you feel anxious, afraid, worried and uptight.

We may have stress related to worrying about getting our houses and businesses put back together, finding housing for the unforeseeable future, uncertainties or problems in relationships, spiritual wellbeing of loved ones, finances and health. God's word reminds us, "...You will keep in perfect peace him whose mind is steadfast, because He trusts in you" (Is 6:3). Stress refers to physical, psychological and spiritual responses to demands. It isn't the demands themselves, as much as "believing in one way and living in another." When the people and activities that are important to us receive little of our time and energy...we feel **STRESSED!** Our faith can help us when we are stressed or overwhelmed with life.

TIPS for COPING WITH STRESS

- Renew yourself and feed your spirit. Rely on God. Read scripture. PRAY!
- Embrace the present. Avoid obsessing on what needs to be done next.
- Living with Hope & Joy. See God active in our lives, not just surviving from one crisis to the next.
- Live a grateful life. Count your blessings.
- Stand like a Mountain...Flow like a River. Use God's perspective in judging which situations require strength and which call us to 'ride the waves and flow with changes.
- Leave. If things are too much, remove yourself from that surrounding.
- Close your eyes. Allow yourself to take a break and get re-centered.
- Try some solitude. Give yourself some alone time-quiet time to set priorities.
- Go outside. Fresh air and sunshine can make a difference being in God's creation. Go for a walk and see how that feels.
- Listen to music. Choose what makes you happy. Sing along.
- Locate some water. Listen to it, watch it, drink it, sit in it. God knows what we need, maybe that's why He put so much of it on earth. Water Refreshes-Renews.
- **BREATHE!** Remember to exhale. When your shoulders are up to your ears, it's time to take some deep breaths. Exhale all the air in your lungs-do 3-4 times. Stress causes shallow breathing, deep breathing releases stress.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

Luke 16:19-31

What does this parable tell us about God and divine judgment?
